The Order of Celebrating Matrimony without Mass

THE INTRODUCTORY RITES

The Introductory Rites help the faithful come together as one, establish communion and prepare themselves to listen to the Word of God and to celebrate the Eucharist worthily.

ENTRANCE PROCESSION

The bridal party enter in procession.

SIGN OF THE CROSS

All make the Sign of the Cross as the Priest or Deacon

In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit.

Amen.

GREETING

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, and the love of God. and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

Grace to you and peace

from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

The Lord be with you.

And with your spirit.

Introduction

The minister welcomes everyone to the celebration and invites all present to pray for and support the couple.

THE COLLECT

After the Introduction the minister says:

Let us pray.

And all pray in silence with the minister for a while. Then the minister says the Collect prayer, at the end of which the people acclaim:

Amen.

THE LITURGY OF THE WORD

By hearing the word proclaimed in worship, the faithful again enter into the unending dialogue between God and the covenant people.

FIRST READING

To indicate the end of the reading, the reader acclaims:

The word of the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

PSALM

After the First Reading the psalmist or cantor sings or says the Psalm, with the people making the response.

SECOND READING

There may also be a second reading. It concludes with the same response as above.

Or:

The assembly stands to sing the Gospel Acclamation to welcome the Gospel. They remain standing in honour of the Gospel reading, the high point of the Liturgy of the Word.

The Lord be with you.

And with your spirit.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to N.

Glory to you, O Lord.

At the end of the Gospel, the Deacon, or the Priest, acclaims:

The Gospel of the Lord.

Praise to you, Lord Jesus Christ.

THE HOMILY

At the end of the Homily it is appropriate for there to be a brief silence for recollection.

THE CELEBRATION OF MARRIAGE

God disposed man and woman for each other so that they might be 'no longer two but one'. In this way they are to live in love, be fruitful, and this way become a sign of God himself, who is nothing but overflowing love.

Introduction

THE OUESTIONS BEFORE THE CONSENT

The minister asks the couple about their freedom of choice, fidelity to each other, and the acceptance and upbringing of children.

THE CIVIL DECLARATION OF FREEDOM

The couple declare their freedom to marry.

THE CONSENT

The couple give their consent to one another, pledging to love and cherish their spouse for ever.

THE RECEPTION OF THE CONSENT

The minister prays for the couple. He then invites those present to praise God.

Let us bless the Lord.

Thanks be to God.

THE BLESSING AND GIVING OF RINGS The couple exchange rings as a sign of their marriage.

Hymn

A hymn may be sung.

THE PRAYER OF THE FAITHFUL

After each intention there is a pause while the faithful pray.

Lord, in your mercy.

Hear our prayer.

The minister concludes the Prayer with a collect.

THE LORD'S PRAYER

At the Saviour's command and formed by divine teaching, we dare to say:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

THE NUPTIAL BLESSING

The minister prays for and blesses the couple so that they may grow in love and fidelity. At the end of the long prayer the people acclaim:

Amen.

THE CONCLUDING RITES

The Concluding Rites send the people forth to put into effect in their lives what they have received.

BLESSING

The Lord be with you.

And with your spirit.

May almighty God bless you, the Father, and the Son. and the Holy Spirit.

Amen.

DISMISSAL

Then the Deacon, or the Priest says:

Go forth, the Mass is ended.

Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord. Or: Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life. Or:

Go in peace. Thanks be to God.

The dismissal may be followed by a final hymn.

SIGNING OF THE REGISTER

The couple, witnesses and minister sign the Register.
