FROM MORNING PRAYER - PSALM 149 - The saints rejoice

"The members of the Church, God's new people, will rejoice in their king, who is Christ" (Hesychius)

Alleluia. The Lord has risen, as he promised. Alleluia.



FIRST READING OF THE DAY - ACTS OF THE APOSTLES 4:13-21

The rulers, elders and scribes were astonished at the assurance shown by Peter and John, considering they were uneducated laymen; and they recognised them as associates of Jesus; but when they saw the man who had been cured standing by their side, they could find no answer. So they ordered them to stand outside while the Sanhedrin had a private discussion. 'What are we going to do with these men?' they asked. 'It is obvious to everybody in Jerusalem that a miracle has been worked through them in public, and we cannot deny it. But to stop the whole thing spreading any further among the people, let us caution them never to speak to anyone in this name again.'

So they called them in and gave them a warning on no account to make statements or to teach in the name of Jesus. But Peter and John retorted, 'You must judge whether in God's eyes it is right to listen to you and not to God. We cannot promise to stop proclaiming what we have seen and heard.' The court repeated the warnings and then released them; they could not think of any way to punish them, since all the people were giving glory to God for what had happened.



All around the world, people are finding that they have a choice. The pandemic is forcing us to live very differently from our usual way of life. We are thinking and acting in ways that would have been inconceivable to us just a couple of months ago. Some people have chosen to act selfishly but the vast majority have discovered a deeper sense of a shared humanity than ever before. Ordinary people are finding the "creativity of love" called for by Pope Francis that is enabling them to reach out beyond isolation to neighbours and people they will never meet in this life. Although they are following the guidance of governments and churches, ordinary — or lay — people are finding that they have prodigious gifts and skills which they can use to make the world just that bit better.

- Read the passage slowly observing the dynamics between the different characters and what they represent.
- Which words, phrases or insight seem to resonate most deeply with you today? Jot them down or repeat them several time to memorise them.
- Reflect back over the last few weeks and make a note of the times when something ordinary
 people have done or said has had a big impact. Give thanks that they trusted the gifts God has
 given them (whether they recognised it themselves or not). Pray for a continued sense of
 solidarity into the future.
- Use your word or phrase as a mantra as you go through the morning.

THE GOSPEL OF THE DAY - MARK 16:9-15

Having risen in the morning on the first day of the week, Jesus appeared first to Mary of Magdala from whom he had cast out seven devils. She then went to those who had been his companions, and who were mourning and in tears, and told them. But they did not believe her when they heard her say that he was alive and that she had seen him.

After this, he showed himself under another form to two of them as they were on their way into the country. These went back and told the others, who did not believe them either. Lastly, he showed himself to the Eleven themselves while they were at table. He reproached them for their incredulity and obstinacy, because they had refused to believe those who had seen him after he had risen.

And he said to them, 'Go out to the whole world; proclaim the Good News to all creation.'

- Spend a few minutes playing the events in today's gospel over in your mind and heart.
- Look back over the gospel appearances that we have prayed with. Which seems to you today to be the one that has spoken to you most deeply? Try to explore why it has particular meaning for you.
- What might you take from your Holy Week and Easter Week retreat into the future? What
 have you received that will help you to proclaim the Good News not to the whole world,
 perhaps, but to those around you?

Let us pray.


