Pryahawn da bawb (Good afternoon everybody). Prin houn da bawb.

I have three short messages that I would like to give you: First of all, I wish to ask the Papal Nuncio if he would kindly convey a message to the Holy Father for me. **May God forgive you for what you have done to me!**

My second message is to the priests of the diocese. It comes from a sticker plastered across the rear windscreen that I saw on a car on the M4. Around it were other stickers that read: Baby on board, Child in car and even Mother-in-law in boot!

But the sticker that caught my eye and seems most appropriate as my message to you on this occasion, read: **Be patient with me, God hasn't finished making me yet!**

But I have no need to tell you that. Even so, may I make this small present to you. If you ask what it is, the only thing I can say is: I'm sorry I haven't a clue!
