especially during the Octave of Prayer for Christian Unity (18-25 January)

The Sick and Those Who Care for Them especially on the World Day for the Sick (11 February)

Students and Teachers especially on the ecumenical Education Day (February)

The Unemployed especially on the Sunday before the First Sunday of Lent
