## Sunday

# Be more attentive to Sunday Mass as the celebration which brings together the entire parish community,

By apostolic tradition, the Church gathers on the Lord's Day to celebrate the Lord's Supper. This Sunday Eucharist, at which the entire local community assembles and in which all play their proper parts, is the primary manifestation of the local Church and, as such, the most important and normative form of Eucharistic celebration. It should be in every sense inclusive and not be needlessly multiplied. Although more than one mass will often be celebrated in a parish on a Sunday a balance needs to be kept between what is convenient, and what helps the Church to become an authentic community of faith and mission and celebrate the Liturgy fully, richly and reverently.

Great importance should therefore be attached to the use of singing in the celebration of the Mass. Every care should be taken that singing by the ministers and the people is not absent in celebrations that occur on Sundays and on holy days of obligation.

### **Practical Points**

- Preparing the liturgical seasons so that connections can be made from Sunday to Sunday.
  - In Ordinary Time the Gospels are divided into sections spread over a number of weeks.
- Print references to the readings (and next week's Gospel) in the newsletter with encouragement to reflect and prepare.
- Identify a simple setting of the Gospel Acclamation and Acclamations in the Eucharistic Prayer which could be sung at any Sunday Mass
- Ask parish groups to take responsibility for welcoming people or for preparing the Prayers of the Faithful — provide necessary formation.
- Have a regular 'singles lunch'.
