



Introduction/Welcome from Oona Stannard to Visions for Leadership Conference

- 1. Good morning. On behalf of my colleagues at the Catholic Education Service for England and Wales and Reverend Dr James Hanvey, Director of the Heythrop Institute for Religion, Ethics and Public Life, I would like to welcome you to this important conference.

- 5. Pope John Paul II said that teaching has an extraordinary moral depth and is one of humanities excellent and creative activities. He noted that the teacher does not write on inanimate material, but on the very spirit of human beings. I am sure that you will agree that this noble calling and its positive impact is multiplied many times when thinking of the role of the headteacher of a Catholic school. (And I say this as one who still believes firmly that headteachers should firstly be experienced teachers.)

6. Nevertheless, we cannot deny that we face many challenges in securing a sufficient number of well qualified headteachers for our Catholic schools. That is why the focus of today's activities is to give time and space to think more deeply about the leaders that we need and want for our schools, and, as importantly, to consider their needs and what support we, as the Catholic community, should put in place for those aspiring to this noble vocation and those who are currently in the position of headteacher. Your contribution to these deliberations, whether as current school leader, school governor, diocesan officer or other member of the Church will be invaluable and I thank you for this.
