# **Reading Luke in Lent**

# Gospel of Luke 17:1-19

#### Temptations to Sin

- And he said to his disciples,
  'Temptations to sin are sure to come,
  but woe to the one through whom they come!
- <sup>2</sup> It would be better for him if a millstone were hung around his neck
- and he were cast into the sea than that he should cause one of these little ones to sin.
- <sup>3</sup> Pay attention to yourselves!
- If your brother sins, rebuke him, and if he repents, forgive him,
- <sup>4</sup> and if he sins against you seven times in the day, and turns to you seven times, saying, "I repent," you must forgive him.'

#### Increase Our Faith

- <sup>5</sup> The apostles said to the Lord, 'Increase our faith!'
- <sup>6</sup> And the Lord said,
  - 'If you had faith like a grain of mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, "Be uprooted and planted in the sea," and it would obey you.

#### Unworthy Servants

- <sup>7</sup> 'Will any one of you who has a servant plowing or keeping sheep say to him when he has come in from the field, "Come at once and recline at table"?
- <sup>8</sup> Will he not rather say to him,
  "Prepare supper for me, and dress properly, and serve me while I eat and drink,
  - and afterward you will eat and drink"?
- <sup>9</sup> Does he thank the servant because he did what was commanded?
- <sup>10</sup> So you also, when you have done all that you were commanded, say, "We are unworthy servants; we have only done what was our duty."

#### Jesus Cleanses Ten Lepers

- <sup>11</sup> On the way to Jerusalem he was passing along between Samaria and Galilee.
- <sup>12</sup> And as he entered a village,
- he was met by ten lepers, who stood at a distance
- <sup>13</sup> and lifted up their voices, saying,
- 'Jesus, Master, have mercy on us.'
- When he saw them he said to them,'Go and show yourselves to the priests.'And as they went they were cleansed.
- <sup>15</sup> Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice;
- and he fell on his face at Jesus" feet, giving him thanks.Now he was a Samaritan.



- <sup>17</sup> Then Jesus answered,
  - 'Were not ten cleansed? Where are the nine?
- <sup>18</sup> Was no one found to return and give praise to God except this foreigner?'
- <sup>19</sup> And he said to him, 'Rise and go your way; your faith has made you well.'

## Reflection

The worried apostles are reminded of their future duties in a short parable. They will plough the field so that the seed of God's word can be sown; they will look after their flocks. They will be true servants, as Jesus has modelled, offering the Eucharist to eat and drink.

The lepers are cleansed because they recognise Jesus as Master and act upon his word in faith. The Samaritan acknowledges Jesus as king and offers thanksgiving. Jesus sends him on his way saying that his faith has saved him.

- The apostles ask Jesus, 'Increase our faith'. The Samaritan leper gives an example of saving faith which can seemingly do the impossible.
  - When is your faith strong? When does it need to be strengthened?

### Prayer

God, the rock of our salvation, whose gifts can never fail, deepen the faith you have already bestowed and let its power be seen in your servants.

We make our prayer through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God for ever and ever. Amen.
