

WORD OF GOD

Psalm 103

My soul, give thanks to the Lord all my being, bless his holy name. My soul, give thanks to the Lord and never forget all his blessings.

It is he who forgives all your guilt, who heals every one of your ills, who redeems your life from the grave, who crowns you with love and compassion, who fills your life with good things, renewing your youth like an eagle's.

The Lord does deeds of justice, gives judgment for all who are oppressed. He made known his ways to Moses and his deeds to Israel's sons.

The Lord is compassion and love, slow to anger and rich in mercy. His wrath will come to an end; he will not be angry for ever. He does not treat us according to our sins nor repay us according to our faults.

For as the heavens are high above the earth so strong is his love for those who fear him. As far as the east is from the west so far does he remove our sins.

As a father has compassion on his sons, the Lord has pity on those who fear him; for he knows of what we are made, he remembers that we are dust.

QUESTIONS FOR CONVERSATION

What name do we use to call upon God in prayer? Is it new to us that God's principle name is *mercy*?

As in the gospels people call out to Jesus for mercy, is there a *tender spot* in our lives that is in need of the Lord's healing touch (or are these the things we prefer to hide from God)?

How are we called to mirror the merciful love of God in our families and in our communities, particularly during this season of Lent?

Re-read the Scripture passage for this session. You may like to follow the reading with a time of prayer and intercession after which you might pray the OUR FATHER.

FINAL PRAYER

Loving Father, you are a God of mercy and compassion.

We thank you for sending your Son, Jesus, into our world to show and teach us how to love.

When we walk through the
Door of Mercy during this Holy Year,
may we open our hearts to you
so that we may reflect your love, mercy
and compassion in our families,
communities and parishes.

May we walk with Jesus through the 'streets of Galilee', comforting the sick, opening our arms to the 'little ones', sharing with the poor and searching out the marginalised in our society.

May it be a year when barriers between us fall and reconciliation becomes possible: a year when our faith in your mercy is strengthened and we learn how to be your face of mercy in our world. Amen.
