### **Important Witness**



'I would like to begin my remarks by expressing the Catholic Church's appreciation for the important witness that all of you bear as spiritual men and women living at a

time when religious convictions are not always understood or appreciated. The presence of committed believers in various fields of social and economic life speaks eloquently of the fact that the spiritual dimension of our lives is fundamental to our identity as human beings, that man, in other words, does not live by bread alone (cf. Deut 8:3). As followers of different religious traditions working together for the good of the community at large, we attach great importance to this "side by side" dimension of our cooperation, which complements the "face to face" aspect of our continuing dialogue.'

'On the spiritual level, all of us, in our different ways, are personally engaged in a journey that grants an answer to the most important question of all – the question concerning the ultimate meaning of our human existence. The quest for the sacred is the search for the one thing necessary, which alone satisfies the longings of the human heart. In the fifth century, Saint Augustine described that search in these terms: "Lord, you have created us for yourself and our hearts are restless until they rest in you" (Confessions, Book I, 1). As we

embark on this adventure we come to realise more and more that the initiative lies not with us, but with the Lord: it is not so much we who are seeking him, but rather he who is seeking us, indeed it was he who placed that longing for him deep within our hearts.' Pope Benedict XVI, 17th Sept. 2010

#### Saint of the Month: St Margaret Clitherow

Pope Benedict invited us to share and celebrate our Catholic heritage. This month we focus on St Margaret Clitherow.

'St. Margaret Clitherow was born in Middleton, England, in 1555, of protestant parents. Possessed of good looks and full of wit and merriment, she was a charming personality. In 1571, she married John Clitherow, a well-to-do grazier and butcher (to whom she bore two children), and a few years later entered the Catholic Church. Her zeal led her to harbor fugitive priests, for which she was arrested and imprisoned by hostile authorities. She was

condemned to be pressed to death on March 25, 1586.

'The humanity and holiness of this servant of God can be readily glimpsed in her words to a friend when she learned of her condemnation: "The sheriffs have said that I am going to die this coming Friday; and I feel the weakness of my flesh which is



troubled at this news, but my spirit rejoices greatly. For the love of God, pray for me and ask all good people to do likewise." Her feast day is March 26th.'

Three bishops, representatives from 19 dioceses and from a broad cross section of Catholic organisations were among nearly 90 delegates who came together to pray, share experiences and good practice. The focus of the day was the needs of baptised Roman Catholics who for different reasons never or rarely participate in parish life.

## **Journey of Faith**



More than 4,700 people gathered in Cathedrals across England and Wales recently as part of their preparation to be received into the Catholic Church.

It is estimated that around 900 of those people will be received into the Catholic Church and registered as members of the Personal Ordinariate of Our Lady of Walsingham during Holy Week; this includes 61 former Anglican clergy in addition to the five who have already been ordained as Catholic priests.

Each year those preparing to join the Catholic Church are invited to attend a gathering called the Rite of Election. A number have expressed that the visit of the Holy Father in 2010 was an encouragement to them in their journey of faith.
