

OUR WORKSHOP LEADERS

1. PRAYER: How to make prayer the foundation of your missionary parish



Rt Rev Alan Williams sm was ordained a priest for the Society of Mary [Marist Fathers] in 1983 and became the seventh Bishop of Brentwood in 2014. He previously served as Director of the Roman Catholic National Shrine at Walsingham, where he had overall responsibility for pilgrimages and retreats. He has also worked as a Teacher and Chaplain in Secondary Schools, and as a University Chaplain, teaching Christian Spirituality at postgraduate level. He is a former Major Superior of the Marist Fathers in England [2000-2008] and has served as a Parish

Priest in the Archdiocese of Southwark. Rt Rev Williams is the Bishop of Brentwood and is leading the workshop session titled: **How to make prayer the foundation of your missionary parish.**

2. VISION: How to create a vision and strategy for parish evangelisation



Anne Marie Salgo is the coordinator of evangelisation ministries in the West End of London. Since 2006 she has worked with the four Catholic parishes there, developing and directing various outreach initiatives. She studied theology, social work and mental health in Hungary, and most recently, pursued a special interest in the psychology of religion. Her passion for sharing the Good News led her to be one of the organisers of the annual Spirit in the City evangelisation festival. Though she loves the hustle and bustle of the city, and meeting God through people, art and beauty, she finds balance

3. TEAM: How to form a parish evangelisation team



Sharon Beech is Project Development Co-ordinator for the Department for Evangelisation in Salford Diocese. A mother of three and grandmother to five, Sharon has worked for Salford Diocese for 18 years, firstly as a parish office administrator and in recent years for the Department for Evangelisation. She has a Bachelors and Masters degree in Theology and Religious Studies and has written on the impact of Christianity on the Inuit and the anthropology of ritual in a secular society. She has also written articles for the Paulist Evangelisation Ministries in Washington DC. Sharon has recently co-authored the book 'Welcome to Witness. Becoming an Evangelising Parish' with Paul Cannon.
